

Final Recommendations for an ENERGY STAR and Title 24 Sticker on New Construction Fixtures

After consultation with CEC and at the request of lighting manufacturers, EPA has compiled the following list of recommendations for the optional ENERGY STAR/Title 24-2005 compliance sticker. In order to facilitate acceptance of ENERGY STAR qualified fixtures as compliant with Title 24-2005, EPA recommends that a temporary sticker be placed on ENERGY STAR qualified fixtures for new construction in California as of October 1, 2005.

Content and Appearance:

- The sticker incorporates the ENERGY STAR certification mark and a reference to Title 24, 2005.



- The size of the label may vary as long as the following ENERGY STAR labeling guidelines are met:
 - The ENERGY STAR certification mark itself should not be smaller than .375" X .375" for legibility purposes.
 - Any other text must be at least 1/3 the height of the graphic box away from the mark.
- The label is black and white to keep printing costs at a minimum for those manufacturers that choose to use it.

Placement Logistics:

- Whenever possible, the sticker should be placed on the outside of the fixture, at the relamping point, or elsewhere on the housing. This will make the location of the sticker visible for inspectors and builders.
- Due to the variety of fixtures available, the above guideline may not be possible, in which case the manufacturer may choose an alternate location visible after installation.

Placement Options:

- Since not all fixture finishes are conducive to the use of an adhesive sticker, acceptable alternatives to an adhesive sticker include the use of hang-tags or static clings on glass diffusers.
- When designing a hang-tag or static cling, it is permissible to change the dimensions of the label; however, you must still adhere to all ENERGY STAR labeling guidelines, paying particular attention to those included above.
